Broward College Receives Largest-Ever Jobs Grant

Through a partnership with the Urban League of Broward County, the College has been awarded \$3,187,500 by the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund to create the Critical Occupation Response through Education (CORE) program. The joint initiative provides workforce training for advanced manufacturing, aviation and information technology. The program will also provide real-world workforce training for 1,500 individuals over three years and create more than 1,275 local jobs. The grant is the largest amount ever awarded for a single project.

Thomas Friedman Explores ‘Big Trends’ at Broward College Speaker Series

On February 21, renowned *New York Times* columnist and author Thomas Friedman addressed issues facing the world as part of the 2018 Broward College Speaker Series. The topic was “The Big Trends Shaping the World Today: Economics, Technology, & Geopolitics.” Nearly 600 people

gathered to listen to Friedman discuss current social, political and complex issues and answer questions at the Broward Center for the Performing Arts. The evening was sponsored by SunTrust and moderated by Rosemary O’Hara of the *Sun Sentinel*.

Earlier in the day, Friedman spoke with students during a fireside chat at Broward College North Campus in Coconut Creek about his first-hand experience with the biggest news and events impacting the world. Friedman has written seven books on topics such as international finance and trade, the 9/11 terrorist attacks, the environment and the role of America today. He is a three-time Pulitzer Prize winner and has covered monumental stories from around the globe for the *The New York Times* since 1981.

Trauma and bereavement representatives including counselors with animal-assisted therapy were in attendance.

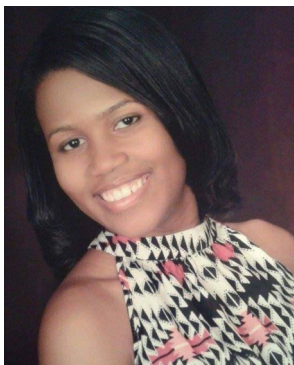

Broward College Student Named Coca-Cola Academic Team Silver Scholar



Medjyna Moreau, a student at Broward College, has been named a 2018 Coca-Cola Academic Team Silver Scholar and will receive a \$1,250 scholarship. College administrators nominate students for the academic team. Selection is based on academic achievement, leadership, and engagement in college and community service.

The Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation sponsors the Coca-Cola Academic Team program by recognizing 50 Gold, 50 Silver, and 50 Bronze Scholars with nearly \$200,000 in scholarships annually. For the first time since 2007, the Broward College men's baseball team appears in the NJCAA Division 1 Rankings. In March, the team had a rating of 11 and is also second in the NJCAA Region 8 Coaches Poll. In the recent game against Miami Dade College (MDC), the Seahawk men scored 10 to MDC's 3, thanks to brilliant pitching by Brian Van Belle, who pitched eight innings allowing seven hits, three runs

(two earned), one walk and struck out eight. He retired nine of the last 10 batters faced with three on strikeouts. Jouseph Renovalles went 3 for 4 with a double, scored on a stolen base and collected three RBIs. Alex Carballo finished 2 for 3 with a double. Onix Vega drove in two runs with a single and Jeremiah Adams hit an RBI single.

The Foundation is family managed and believes firmly in the importance of education and the arts.

Model UN Wins Outstanding Position Paper Award



The Broward College Model United Nations (MUN) team was recognized during the March Board of Trustees meeting for their accomplishments at the National Model UN Competition in New York City.

Broward College MUN placed 25 out of over 200 higher education teams to earn the distinction of Outstanding Delegation. In addition, the eight-member team coached by Professor Kari Herbert won two position paper awards. The national MUN staff commended the chairmanship of the team. The competition allows students to roleplay delegates to the United Nations and simulate UN committees.
